

Singular Nouns + Be - Subjects with singular nouns use the verb **is**.

My car **is** nice.
This shirt **is** blue.
The game **is** exciting.
The sky **is** blue.

Plural Nouns + Be - Subjects with plural nouns use the verb **are**.

My eyes **are** brown.
The apples **are** sweet.
The clouds **are** gray.
The bananas **are** delicious.

Non-Count Nouns+ Be - For nouns you cannot count, use the verb **is**.

The air **is** dirty.
The weather **is** bad.
The time **is** near.
My energy **is** low.

Plurals vs. Singular nouns - We usually use the plural noun when talking about things in general.

Apples **are** red.
I love peaches.
Cars **are** expensive.
I like pink flowers.
